I thought I might share these with you. At the same time, I decided to try something similar on the CYCT Facebook page where everyone has a chance to share one of their favourite anchorages that fits a particular category eg: best sunsets, best beach, East Coast, Tasman Peninsula, etc. and include photos. Join us on Facebook to participate. If successful I will try to

share a summary in the Albatross. Here are some of my favourite anchorages on the Queensland

Coast. Check these out on Navionics & Google Earth:

# Watsons Bay, Lizard Island

Where: NW coast of Lizard Island, 135 nm NNE of Cairns

Why: Remote continental island, surrounded by coral reefs, walking, social, marine research

Winds, bottom type, holding & depth: NE-SSE 40 kn, sand, good holding, 3-8 m,

Entry: Approach from the NW avoiding coral patch to the south

# Michaelmas Cay

Where: GBR, 22nm NE Cairns

Why: Amazing bird colony on Cay, fantastic fish, and coral when snorkelling

Winds, bottom type, holding & depth: GBRMPA mooring near cay, sand good holding, 5-10m

NE end

Entry: Challenging entry by visual reef navigation from NW avoiding many coral bommies

# Walker Reef

Where: GBR, 23nm NE of Orpheus Island

Why: Close, great views of Hinchinbrook Is., fantastic snorkelling, small sand cay, few boats.

Winds, bottom type, holding & depth: ESE-S 25kn, sand & coral, good holding, 4-6m

Entry: Cautious entry by visual reef navigation from NW,

# Shark Bay, Cape Upstart

Where: NW coast Cape Upstart

Why: Remote, secure anchorage, rustic headland, lovely beaches.

Winds, bottom type, holding & depth: NE-S 30kn, sand, good holding, 4-8m

Entry: Clear from the W-NW, watch for the rock "the Bun" 200m NW of the Cape.

# Thomas Island

Where: N coast of Thomas Island, 30nm SE of Airlie Beach Why: No charter boats, remote anchorage, very pretty spot.

Winds, bottom type, holding & depth: SE-SSW 20kn, sand, good holding, 4-6m Entry: Safe entry from the N, watch for strong tidal flows W and E of island.

# Lady Musgrave Lagoon -

Where: Bunker Group,  $55 nm\ N$  of Burnett Heads.

Why: Turquoise water, snorkelling, Coral Island,

Winds, bottom type, holding & depth: All round protection up to 25kn, Sand, good holding,

8m

Entry: Deep entrance, bommies to avoid crossing the lagoon by visual reef navigation

# Rooney Point, Fraser Island

Where: NW tip of Fraser Island

Why: Every evening many pods of humpback whale swim past and under your vessel.

Winds, bottom type, holding & depth: NNE-S, sand, good holding, 5 – 15m. Entry: Open bay, shoals N of point. Don't stay if storms are forecast

The Sand Hills, Moreton Bay

Where: Moreton Island, Moreton Bay

Why: Magnificent sandhills to climb, great beach, lots of space & plenty of company Winds, bottom type, holding & depth: NNE-SSE 40kn, sand, good holding, 5 - 10m

Entry: Clear entry from W

# **CYCT Development Fund Development Fund**

At the discretion of the Committee, the CYCT maintains a Development Fund to promote training of members to improve their sailing and on-water skills. All skills areas including, but not limited to, sailing, boat handling, vessel maintenance, navigation, safety, and regulations are to be encouraged. The rules governing the Development Fund are: I. The annual allocation and the subsidy will be set by the Committee from time to time. Albatross June 2023 22 2. There will be an annual maximum fund allocation (Note 1). Once the funds are exhausted within a particular year (I July to 30 June), then no more applications will be accepted until the next year, and rule 6 will still apply. 3. Open to any CYCT member, who has been a full member for at least I year. 4. Members are eligible to a subsidy (Note 2) towards the cost of a training course. 5. A member may only apply for one subsidy per year (1 July to 30 June). 6. Written applications must be received by the Committee after completion of the course but no later than 60 days after completion. 7. A member may only receive funding once for a particular course. 8. Only approved courses as determined by the Committee are eligible. As a guide (but would have to be looked at individually before approval), most Sail Train courses run by DSS and courses organized by the CYCT would be approved. Because it's impractical to provide a complete list of courses, applicants are advised to enquire beforehand. Note 1: 2017 initial allocation is \$500. Note 2: 2017 initial subsidy is 30% of the cost of the course up to a maximum of \$60.



# Winter Forum: Fire Workshop - Essential learning - Blair Bryant

On Tuesday, 11 July, CYCT hosted it's second 2023 Winter Workshop: this time on marine fire prevention and management. It was well done. TAS Fire provided four marine-focused fire fighters, along with dramatic photos and compelling slides.

The workshop was highly participatory with CYCT members asking their questions throughout the session.



# My key takeaways included:

- All but one CYCT attending members have never encountered a fire at sea. (Yet, one member had dealt with two offshore fires.)
- Toxic smoke is the primary killer in marine fires. (20 to 40 seconds exposure can result in death.)
- Boat fires in marinas are particularly threatening. Fires can spread quickly to adjacent boats. Narrow and long gangways restrict rapid firefighting access. Often fire hoses cannot reach outer slips.
- Smoke and carbon monoxide alarms are essential.
- A key challenge to fire fighters is identifying people sleeping in threatened boats.

# Key points as summarized by the TAS Fire team are:

- Onboard Fuel Loads
  - De-clutter the boat and ensure fuel sources are stowed securely away from ignition sources where possible.
- Cooking Practices
  - Never leave cooking oil unattended. Set a reminder when things are in the oven. Beware of loose items around the galley.
- Electrical Systems and electronics Installations
  - Check wiring and connections regularly. The ocean isn't kind to electricity and electronics.

 Lithium Batteries (house & starting batteries, tools, personal electronics, bikes, scooters etc.)

- Only keep high quality lithium batteries on board. Don't charge lithium batteries on board where possible.
- Hazardous Atmospheres (either poisonous or flammable)
  - Keep the boat well-ventilated when weather permits. Install a Carbon Monoxide detector. Check exhausts.
- Overheating Machinery
  - Check cooling systems and bearings/grease points at regular intervals. Check your engine box has a small hatch for firefighting.
- Lightning Strikes
  - Understand your boat's lightning protection, and make sure that the boat is grounded against strikes.
- Firefighting Equipment not inspected / maintained / sufficient.
  - Have several options in different areas on board. Inspect them regularly.
     Label them. Know how to use them!

Thank you, once again, to TAS Fire, Stephen Raudino, Warren Frey, Stuart Peel, and Adam Lincoln for sharing your knowledge, experience, and learnings. CYCT members are more firesafe given your efforts.





# Extract from The Voyage of the Evangelist by the Rev. Fred CB Fairey when he crosses the East Bay Neck to reach Norfolk Bay – Erika Shankley



Rev. Fairey had imported the 'Rob Roy' canoe from England. It was built of oak, mahogany and cedar, copper fastened and varnished length 12 feet, depth 12 inches, beam, 28 inches, weighing 79 pounds. The vessel had a mast and sail and various lockers in which to stow stores. His voyage took him just under a month, setting off from Forth, on Tasmania's north-west coast on Monday 27th January, arriving in Hobart Town (as it was then known) 9pm Monday 24th February 1879.

Having had to abort his attempt to get through the Marion Narrows, Rev. Fairey and the *Evangelist* had found a more sheltered landing place a little to the south. However, with no habitation nearby, he resolved to explore the surrounding bushland in an effort to reach Blackman Bay overland.

"Breakfast over, the first thing was to look about me. Climbing up the hill which lay behind my camping ground, I noticed that inside the line of the sandhills, there seemed to be a lagoon partly dry. The thought occurred to me, would it be possible, partly by the help of the lagoon, to get the canoe over into Blackman's Bay?

Taking some biscuits and cheese with me, and my paddle, I made my way up a valley in the bottom of which the ground was swampy and, in some places, covered with shallow water. The bush had been cleared from undergrowth and was open, the trees being scattered and among them I was glad to see sheep and young cattle feeding. The hill to my right I found very rocky. At some distance from the beach I came to a good waterhole and was very glad to refresh myself with a drink of water. Resuming my journey, I followed the valley, keeping above the low parts and with the hill within sight, after travelling about three miles I had the pleasure of seeing the waters of the south arm of Blackman's Bay stretched out before me. I could see no house near, so I followed the bay round, walking on the side of the hill in the sheep tracks, and at length I reached a point of high land and came in sight of the narrows. It was now blowing a strong breeze from the west. Under the point I saw an old house, and thought my troubles were ended, but on going down to it I found it empty and forsaken, and there was no sign of any other habitation on this side of the bay. On the farther shore I could see a number of farmhouses, but they were beyond my reach as long as the canoe lay where she did, by the sea six miles from the point upon which I stood."

The only thing I could do was to retrace my steps and endeavour to carry or drag the canoe over to Blackman's  $Bay. \dots$ ."

By now it was quite dark, and to his astonishment, he saw a light!

"Thinking it might be a bushfire I looked again; it was in the direction of the sea. The light burned steadily; it must be a house ... My hopes raising every moment, I jumped fences, climbed sandhills, passed outbuilding, and when I discovered a long, low building, from one of the windows of which the light shone, it was with feelings of gratitude to a kind Providence that I leapt the garden fence and gave a loud rap with my fist at the door. I heard a shuffling of feet; a few moments afterwards a tall young man opened the door. I said, "I'm not a shipwrecked sailor, but I am next door to one," The reply was,

"Oh, you must be the gentleman who is journeying round the coast in a canoe." "Yes," I said, "and if you will kindly give me a drink of water, I shall be very thankful indeed."

I was ushered into a lighted room and found myself the centre of a surprised group; the young lady wife of my host, her young cousin - a girl of fifteen- a young man who acted as shepherd, and a boy who worked about the house. I was not very presentable; my hand was black with digging clay, I had no coat on - having left it in the canoe; but I was received with the greatest kindness by Mr. and Mrs Allison, and the hearty reception I met with at Lagoon Bay, Forestier's Peninsula, will, I trust, never be forgotten by me. ....

It was now nearly eleven o'clock. Shaking hands and bidding good-night to all, I was conducted by Mr. Allison to a comfortable bedroom, and I need hardly say that after the labours of the day I enjoyed a profound night's rest.

Friday, February 21st - It was with a thankful heart that I rose this morning, feeling none the worse for the adventures of the preceding day. After breakfast, Mr. Allison walked over to the canoe, and I found that I had unknown to myself, crossed the point that separated Lagoon Bay from the bay upon which I had landed, and in the darkness I had come out upon the beach near the house.

My friend Mr. Allison was very much surprised when he saw the canoe and could hardly believe that such a tiny vessel had travelled in safety such a long distance on the open sea. We brought over some of the baggage which had been left on the beach and it was arranged that after dinner we should bring the bullock-dray and take the canoe over to Blackman's Bay, but we did not expect that I should be able to resume my voyage, as although the day was bright and fine it was blowing very hard.

After dinner we started with the dray, packed the canoe and fittings securely, and following a rough track reached the corner of Blackman's Bay early in the afternoon. It was blowing a gale from the west, but we laid the canoe under the shelter of an old shed, and having packed everything inside, returned to Lagoon Bay in time for tea. .....


The house nestles under the hills on the south side of the bay, and several paddocks enclosed by good fences, with woolshed, stable and cowhouse, and stockyard make up the necessary buildings belonging to a sheep-run and connected with a comfortable homestead. The run extends to the north to the brush fence on Two Mile Beach Bay and to the west round the shores of Blackman's Bay nearly to the narrows.

On Sunday, February 23rd, in the morning, I held a service in the parlour of Mr. Allison's house. It was an interesting service to us all, as the first service ever held at Lagoon Bay. In conversation with Mrs. Allison during the day I found that as a resident of Hobart Town she had been engaged in church work and missed very much the usual means of grace. An occasional service was held at East Bay Neck, but as there was only a bridle track for a part of the way it was but seldom she could make the journey on horseback.

In the afternoon Mr. Allison and myself, accompanied by the two sheep dogs, went for a walk up the hills on the northern side of the bay. We climbed up through the bush following the sheep tracks, constantly ascending, until we reached the highest point overlooking the sea. We had a splendid view of the ocean and the adjacent coast. It was blowing quite a gale of wind, but being off the land, the sea was calm at the foot of the cliffs. The swell washing among the outlying rocks was a pretty sight, the white foam finding its way back to the ocean in cascades down the black sides of the rocks. Returning

home to tea, we enjoyed a quiet evening in conversation and reading. I could not help thinking that my friends living in this retired spot, while they were cut off from many social advantages, had much to be thankful for; being removed from very much of the sin which is in this world, and escaping a great deal of worry and temptation of life. Surrounded by the most beautiful scenery, having healthful occupation and each other's society, books and newspapers, the residents at Lagoon Bay will be remembered by me as a family singularly favoured and I am under a promise that should I ever visit the southern part of the Island of Tasmania again, I will find my way to the shores of this delightful bay."

# Book Review - Erika Shankley



# Sailing Alone Around the World, Joshua Slocum, Quarto Publishing Group, 2016

A couple of years ago I came across a new edition of Joshua Slocum's classic cruising story *Cruising Alone Around the World*. Updated with sketches, as well as black and white and colour photos, it now has pride of place on my bookshelf.

Joshua Slocum became legendary in his own lifetime, both as a seaman on merchant vessels and a cruising sailor. After refitting *Spray*, he set off on 24 April 1895 from New England, on the east coast of the United States, on a 3-year odyssey, returning home on 3 July 1898.

Of particular interest to us here in Tasmania are descriptions of his visit to ports along the north coast — Beauty Point where he extolled the beauties of "its shady forest ... and met the Governor of NSW, Lord Hampden, and his family who were visiting on their steam yacht." It was here, near Beauty Point, that "people came from a great distance" to hear him talk about his adventures. Beaconsfield with its "great Tasmanian gold mine" rated a mention and at Devonport he slipped the Spray and reapplied another coat of copper paint. He even received an envelope from anonymous lady containing a donation of £5!

After spending a couple of months enjoying Tasmania's hospitality, he set sail again on 16 April 1897 bound for Port Jackson.

This illustrated edition of Sailing Alone Around the World is available in the State Library. Even if you've read previous editions, it's well worth rereading. A classic cruising adventure!

# Message from Mast



Legislation has been enacted to allow boat owners to use Electronic Visual Distress Signals (EVDS) as an alternative to hand-held flares. Battery-operated, EVDS will continue signalling for up to six hours while hand-held flares only burn for about one minute. However, MAST also pointed out that EVDS are not effective during daylight hours. It should also be noted that if using EPDS as an alternative to hand-held flares, boats must have a VHF radio and a GPS registered EPIRB on board. Rocket flares are still required in open Check **MAST** website waters. out the https://mast.tas.gov.au/?s=EVDS for details.



# For OpenCPN users: Beware of over-zooming your chart display - Special Marks around the Kelp Research Area — Andrew Boon

A Kelp Research Area has been established south of Blackmans Bay. This was the subject of a talk by Prof. Craig Johnson at the May General Meeting. There has been a couple of Notices to Mariners about this, including AHO Notice 513(T)/2023 which references MAST notice M214(T)-23, giving details of the area and corner marks.

The caution area and three of the four corner marks are now displayed on the AusENC (official) digital charts, which can be viewed using the OpenCPN software.



It doesn't look right, does it?

But it is correct and when I queried it with the AHO, the explanation is:

"In the area a harbour ENC product covers the southern edge of the caution area and the SE and SW buoys. Therefore, you see both the SE and SW buoys on the ENC. Then to the north the best ENC coverage is a coastal product.

Therefore, so as to maintain product clarity only the NE buoy is shown on the coastal ENC."


The 'harbour ENC product' is cell AU5NWB01, a larger scale (1:18,000) chart of the NW Bay area which covers the southern boundary of the research area. The 'coastal product' is cell AU444147 (1:90,000), which covers the bulk of the area including the NW and NE corners. I normally have *Chart Quilting* enabled in OpenCPN which overlays larger scale charts over the 'coastal' charts and shows all available detail. OpenCPN has an *OverZoom* warning which alerts

you about trying to extract more information than is actually present — but the *OverZoom* warning is based on the largest scale chart in the currently viewable quilted area. When I turn Chart Quilting off and view only the coastal chart in the image above, I get an *OverZoom* warning, and the SW mark is not displayed. Coastal charts are not designed to be viewed at scales greater than I:24,000 and the inshore mark (SW) has a minimum viewing scale of I:21,999, ie it won't appear at the maximum viewing scale of a coastal chart and therefore is not included in the data for the coastal chart.

The reason for this is to prevent the smaller scale chart from being cluttered with fine detail which affects 'product clarity', ie you can only cram so much detail into a chart and still have it clear and readable.

Thus, the *OverZoom* warning applies to the northern part of the image above, even though the warning is not displayed. Please be aware of this whenever you have a quilted display.

To satisfy my desire to see what I know should be there (even when I am viewing a chart at a scale greater than it is designed for) I have added a special mark in the NW corner position to the GPX file of marine farm marks. This file is available for download by members in the Club website folder Member Menu/Documents/Cruising/Charts.

# Commodore

The Commodore is the public face of the Club, promoting the Club and presiding over the Committee and Club affairs. The Commodore has a vote, but not a casting vote. The role includes presiding over Committee, General, and Special meetings and the AGM, ensuring projects and activities of the CYCT are in accordance with the goals and objectives of the organization, and overseeing all legal requirements and Public Officer duties. Availability for member consultations is a priority.

# **Vice Commodore**

The role of the Vice Commodore is to arrange an annual cruise program for Club members. Cruises range from overnight trips to more extended cruises over the course of long weekends. (Note that the VC is not required to lead each cruise – this role can be delegated to any Club member.) The Vice Commodore oversees activities and mentoring that promote safety on the water and encourage members to extend their cruising horizons. The Vice Commodore assists the Commodore in the discharge of his/her duties and officiates in his/her absence.

# Rear Commodore

The Rear Commodore arranges all official club social activities including guest speakers or training activities for meetings.

# **Secretary**

This role facilitates the Club's business and its smooth running. The role includes record keeping in the form of Agenda and Meeting minutes, AGM nominations for Committee positions, dealing with correspondence to and from the Club and generally taking care of all administrative issues that are not the direct responsibility of any other Committee member.

# Treasurer

The Treasurer is responsible for the maintenance of the financial health of the Club and all the financial dealings to achieve this objective. This includes receiving income from subscriptions, banking and reconciling bank accounts, obtaining quotes for insurance, reimbursing approved

Albatross expenses and paying supplier invoices. Monthly financial reports and annual report (P&L and balance sheet) are prepared for the annual audit.

# Editor - Albatross

The Editor is responsible for the preparation of the Club newsletter eleven times a year (no issue in January). This involves receiving (soliciting as required) contributions from Club members and others and formatting them into an appropriate format for printing. The major tasks of the Membership Officer are to maintain the record of members' details and to compile the CYCT Membership book to be printed and mailed with the December Albatross each year. This includes maintaining the data base on the web site and keeping paper records of application forms up to date and passing application information on to the Editor for printing in Albatross. The Membership Officer also works with the Treasurer to manage the records of payment of Club subscriptions.

### Webmaster

The Webmaster is responsible for the maintenance and operation of the Club website by maintaining a secure database of member details, managing Club email aliases and managing the content of the website

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

# **CYCT Moorings**

The CYCT owns two moorings, available for the exclusive use of CYCT and CCCA members (see CCCA MOU).

The use of a Club mooring is always at your own judgment and risk.

The CYCT accepts no liability for damage caused to vessels using the mooring or any damage caused by any failure of the mooring. You must have adequate insurance for your boat and third party liability.

# The following are the rules for the use of CYCT club moorings:

- The Club burgee (CYCT or CCCA) must be displayed on your vessel whilst on a club mooring.
- There must be a current insurance policy in force for the vessel, including third party liability.
- Maximum stay on the mooring is 24 hours; in unusual circumstances, the Vice Commodore may approve an extended stay.
- If a boat without a CYCT or CCCA burgee has picked the mooring up, kindly ask them if they are a member. If they aren't, advise them that the mooring is private and request them to leave.
- Notwithstanding that the moorings are lifted and serviced annually, at all times the use of the moorings remains at member's own risk.
- Members are asked to email the Vice Commodore and register their use of the mooring as soon as practicable.

# North Simmonds Bay, Bruny Island Number 1 - 8584.

Mooring number 8584 at North Simmonds Bay is a yellow buoy with a pillar for the pickup rope. The depth at LMWS is about 5 metres. It is located at 43° 07.446' S, 147° 21.396' E. The mooring consists of 3 wheels, then 6 m of 2 inch chain, then 6 m of 1-1/2 inch chain then 6 m of 5/8 inch chain.

Maximum length permitted by MAST is 12.2 m.

This mooring was last serviced on 3 May 2022

# North Simmonds Bay, Bruny Island Number 2 - 7786.

Mooring number 7786 at North Simmonds Bay is a bright red/pink (Dec. 2020) buoy tail and smaller pale pink float. The depth at LMWS is about 7.5 metres. It is located at 43° 07.481' S, 147° 21.448' E. Maximum length permitted by MAST is 17 m.

This mooring was last serviced on 3 May 2022.
